# OUR IMPACT

Throughout western Washington **3,866** CCS/CHS staff and **2,749** volunteers provided services to **84,693** men, women and children



## CHILDREN AND FAMILIES

**12 REGIONAL FAMILY CENTERS** located throughout western Washington offered an array of programs to **44,890** people, including emergency services, shelter, transitional and permanent housing, mental health and chemical dependency counseling, as well as pregnancy support, case management and volunteer services.

## AGING AND DISABLED

The CCS **LONG TERM CARE SYSTEM** provided **2,034,397** hours of in-home personal care to **18,066** individuals, including help with ambulation, bathing, foot care, transferring, nurse-delegated tasks, meal preparation, senior transportation, senior meal sites and “meals on wheels” for homebound seniors.



## HOUSING AND SHELTER

**CATHOLIC HOUSING SERVICES** provided **4,788** individuals with permanent housing in **2,633** affordable housing units for single adults, veterans, families, seniors and people with special needs.

**22** CCS shelters offered **288,705** emergency bed nights for single adults and families experiencing homelessness. An additional **23,829** bed nights were provided at **24** hotels/motels.

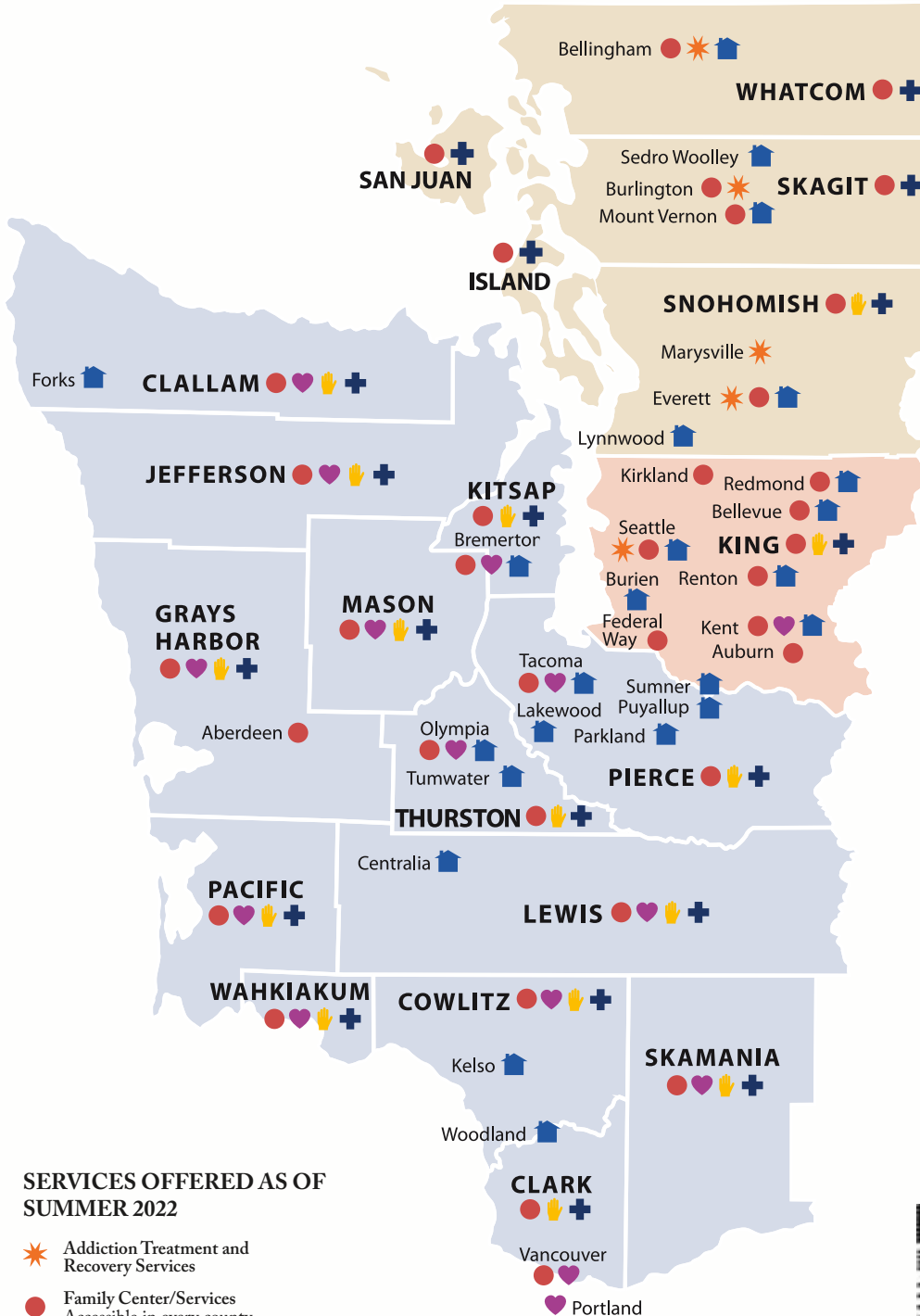
## MENTAL HEALTH AND RECOVERY

**FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH SYSTEM** provided **209,835** hours of in-home behavioral health services to **16,859** children, youth and family members experiencing family conflict due to mental health issues.

An additional **18,929** individuals accessed mental health services and **3,443** clients received addiction recovery counseling from regional CCS providers.

# KING COUNTY REGION

## New Pathways to Home

### Program Highlights

With the addition of the **Sidney Wilson House** in Renton and the **Martina Apartments** in Seattle, CCS added 169 homes to our existing portfolio of 940 transitional and permanent housing units in King County. When COVID-19 forced the closure of the **Sacred Heart Shelter (SHS)** in Seattle, CCS renovated a new location in Kent with transitional apartments for families seeking a permanent place to call home.



*"My husband and I knew it would be hard, but we kept looking for a place for our whole family. I called many places and could not get an answer. That's when we found CCS Sacred Heart Shelter. They were so welcoming! My experience with CCS people was so good!"*

*"Our apartment is beautiful! Skip and I work different shifts at Sea-tac...so one of us is always with the children. The people at Sacred Heart are still our friends."*

The end of tenant COVID-19 protections meant a greater risk of homelessness for King County residents. In response, the CCS King County **Tenant Law Center** collaborated with the Housing Justice Project and the Tenants Union of Washington to create the King County **Tenant Resource Line**, where low-income renters at risk of eviction or who otherwise need legal counsel can call to speak with an attorney five days a week.

*"When I arrived at the CCS Engagement Center in Kent, I was emotionally devastated and needed their strength when I was just clinging to survive. They gave me a room at a shelter, and thanks to the compassion and diligence of my caseworker, I am now in a very nice one-bedroom apartment and looking for employment.*

*I just wanted to thank you and say how grateful I am for all the support and help I have received... I'd like those in need to know there is help and hope."*

## Expanded Services in South King County



CCS is responding to the dramatically increased need for services in South King County. Our newly renovated **Federal Way Family Center** provides **Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)**, **Family Services and Housing to Access Recovery Programs (F-SHARP)**, and an outreach program, **Counseling, Recovery, and Wellness (CRew)**.

The new **Federal Way Day Center** serves unhoused people with access to showers, laundry, kitchen facilities, case management, and connection to supportive services. Both programs now offer primary health care thanks to a new partnership with UW-Harborview Hospital and King County Public Health.

## Pathways to Employment

The **Aspiring Social Services Employee Training (ASSET)** program provides a gateway to entry-level human service careers for our clients with lived experiences of poverty, trauma and homelessness. The three-month program provides essential learning and skills-development classes, a hands-on internship and individualized guidance and support from the ASSET team to help clients prepare for employment at frontline social service agencies, including CCS for interested graduates.

The **Social Services Provider Academy (SSPA)** is a next-step career development opportunity. The pilot college partnership with CCS provides a funded pathway for entry-level staff employed with King County human service providers to earn a short-term college certificate. Significant numbers of entry-level staff in our professional field have lived experiences of poverty, homelessness and racism resulting in barriers to higher education. SSPA provides individualized college navigation and academic support to introduce students to college and foster successful certificate completion.



*"I am a strong, single mother of four children, and I am very grateful for the Social Service Provider Academy program (SSPA). The program allowed me to go to school and still have a full-time job without worrying about how I was going to pay for it. I learned so much about myself, and the instructors were great (and) cared about us and supported us to achieve our goals. I didn't think I would ever be able to attend college. This program has been truly a blessing to me, and I am so grateful. I want to share my experience and support this program so frontline workers like me can reach our dreams, doing the work we know is so important in the community."*

# NETWORK BUILDERS

## Lighting Pathways to Solidarity

## Program Highlights



CCS Network Builders help Catholic parishes and schools live their faith through outreach to neighbors in need, partnering with other local faith communities, the St. Vincent de Paul Society, government and health care institutions, and giving special attention to our Latino communities. Network Builder's work extended to vaccine "hesitation" clinics, flood relief, expansion of the **PREPARES** – Pregnancy and Parenting Support program, a mental health symposium, and listening sessions for the Church's *Synod on Synodality*.

## Northwest Region

Northwest Network Builders collaborated with local parishes to create The Skagit Collaborative Project to support the CCS **Farmworker Center** and **Martha's Place** in Mt. Vernon. They also supported a major parish project to create **Mercy House**, a new social service center in Mountlake Terrace.

## King County Region

King County Network Builders enlisted local parishes and schools to provide needed housing supplies for tenants in the new **Martina Apartments** in Seattle and the new **Sacred Heart Shelter** in Kent.



## Southwest Region

Southwest Network Builders supported **Bertha I** and **Bertha II**, two new non-congregate shelters in Vancouver. They worked with parishes and agency leadership to help agricultural workers and asylum seekers address ongoing health, housing, education and immigration challenges.

## All Regions

Under the guidance of all regional Network Builders, **PREPARES-Pregnancy Parenting Support-Program** is active or in development at 93 western Washington parishes. In 2022, 6,504 clients were served with one-on-one family support from baby showers and essential needs to learning groups and more.



# NORTHWEST REGION

## Program Highlights



*"There's no substitute to having a place to call home. It's clear that housing is very central and crucial to functioning as a human with dignity and the ability to have quality of life. When people are housed, you can start to identify and address other issues and problems."*

CCS Northwest expanded our **Skagit County Emergency Shelter Program** to include 40 chronically unhoused individuals, providing supportive services leading to permanent homes.

CCS Northwest provides housing and supportive care at population centers throughout our region, including 70 new units at **Martha's Place**, Mount Vernon; 42 units at **Francis Place**, Bellingham; and 65 units at **Clare's Place**, Everett; plus 20 units for Veterans at **Sebastian Place**, Lynnwood. Twenty-nine of our low-income housing units in this region have been set aside for people with disabilities.



## Emergency and New Services

CCS programs provided emergency food, shelter, and transportation to employment as second responders for nearly 1,000 households impacted by the winter floods that devastated Whatcom and Skagit Counties. In the aftermath, CCS partnered with the Whatcom Community Foundation to help survivors protect and restore their homes.

In Snohomish County, CCS, St. Pius X Parish, and the St. Vincent de Paul Society broke ground on **Mercy House** in Mountlake Terrace, transforming an underutilized parish building into a new multipurpose facility designed to offer housing, meals, and pregnancy/parenting support to those in need.

# FAMILY BEHAVIORAL HEALTH

## Every Family's Pathway is Unique

### Program Highlights

Family Behavioral Health (FBH) is an innovative system of intensive-home and community-based services within CCSWW. A recognized leader and pioneer among our state's behavioral health agencies, the Washington Council on Behavioral Health named FBH as one of six agencies best qualified to become a teaching clinic for our state's strained mental health system.

FBH's core service areas include **Child and Youth Mobile Crisis Services, Wraparound with Intensive Services (WISe), Community-Based Intensive Treatment, Stabilization Services, Pediatric Integrated Care, Health Homes, and more.**



FBH serves communities in Kitsap, King, Pierce, Thurston, Mason, Grays Harbor, and Clark Counties, as well as three counties in NW Oregon. Over 95% of our services are provided to families insured by Medicaid.

In 2022, FBH provided 209,835 hours of service to 16,859 children, youth, and family members in need of crisis response and de-escalation, intensive mental health treatment, integrated pediatric outpatient services and more.

95% of youth receiving services safely remain with family at service completion. Of these, 87% live with family or relatives and 8% are stabilized in a foster family home.

# SOUTHWEST REGION

## Program Highlights

In Vancouver, **Bertha's I and II**, comprising 94 transitional housing units, opened to serve veterans and older people experiencing homelessness—the first such programs in the region. Eighty residents have moved on to permanent housing during this first year of operation.



*"I am 71 years old. This is my first time being homeless, but now, I have a key and I have a door, and I get to go to my room every night and every day, and I have a safe place to live where it is warm or cool, and I feel very lucky. I'm so grateful to have found these people around me who have blessed me with their kindness. Thank you to everyone who has made this possible. I will forever be grateful."*

In Olympia, CCS initiated supportive services to residents of **Quince Street Village**, a new community of 100 heated, powered micro homes built in collaboration with the City of Olympia and the Faith Alliance Initiative for Tiny Houses. Residents formerly lived in tents and vehicles. In Puyallup, CCS completed a Pierce County pilot housing program to provide twenty or more adults with shelter and critical services.

## Feeding the Hungry

On average, Olympia's **Community Kitchen** has increased its service to primarily unhoused people by more than 2,000 meals a month in 2022. In Aberdeen, CCS **Feed the Hungry** volunteer-run lunch program provides 400-500 hot take-out meals a week.

*"This program matters because it's not just for people experiencing homelessness. We average 100 guests a day, including quite a few families and care-givers. People really depend on it, more than the average person could know. There is such a taboo about talking about hunger; no one likes to admit they need help."*

## Other Services

CCS **Supportive Services for Veteran Families (SSVF)** provided rapid rehousing and case management for 162 veteran families experiencing homelessness in 2022.

# LONG TERM CARE

## When the Pathway to Hope is at Home



### Program Highlights

Every day, our **Long Term Care (LTC)** system's **Home Care** program provides personal care services (bathing, dressing, eating, and medication management) to over 4,000 seniors and people with disabilities to help keep them in their homes and connected to the community. The LTC system also trains thousands of caregivers to provide these vital services as well as provides home-delivered meals, senior transportation, and senior meals at twenty-eight community centers.

CCS advocacy before the Washington State Health Care Authority will make home care more affordable to Washingtonians in 2023 by raising the needs allowance for clients from 100% of the Federal Poverty Level (FPL) to 300%, and by eliminating current copays for 99% of our clients.

The state legislature is replicating our successful pilot shelter program in Tacoma by funding LTC services at five additional CCS shelters in King, Pierce, Clark, and Spokane counties. This funding provides personal care services to guests with functional disabilities.



*"I truly believe that the most valuable part of in-home care is helping our clients remain in their home, surrounded by family, pets, and their life belongings, for as long as it's safe to do so."*

# CATHOLIC HOUSING SERVICES

## Program Highlights



Catholic Housing Services continues to work with public and private partners to respond creatively to our region's critical need for housing. *289 units under construction and opening in 2023.*

**Martha's Place** will provide 70 units of permanent supportive housing for chronically homeless individuals and couples, the first project of its kind in Skagit County. *A collaborative effort between local parishes, the City of Mount Vernon, the county, and Washington State.*

**Elizabeth Thomas Homes** will offer 119 units of affordable housing in Seattle's Rainier Beach neighborhood. *A collaborative project with FAME-EAW (First African Methodist Episcopal Church-Equity Alliance of WA).*

**Shoreline Modular Project**, 100 units of permanent supportive housing in a pilot project designed to expedite low-income housing construction with the use of pre-built modular units. *A collaboration with the City of Shoreline, King County, and Washington State.*

## Strengthening Existing Housing

CHS works with residents to improve community living conditions in our existing housing programs. A great example in 2022 was a massive investment at the **Josephinum** in downtown Seattle to repair and prolong the plumbing life in this historic building. A well-orchestrated sequence over eight months required 150 residents to vacate their apartments and relocate to temporary units in the building. The project was entirely successful thanks to excellent organizing and a spirit of cooperation.



*"If you want the help, this is where you can get it. I had gotten to 35% heart function where I was sleeping in a ditch next to the highway. I knew I wouldn't make it through the winter. I'm happy to be here - and happy to be on my way so another vet can move in and get help."*

# LIFETIME & LEGACY GIVING



Genevieve Albers, a faith-filled Northwest philanthropist, modeled a life of generosity and leadership in the service of others before her passing on Christmas Day, 2001, at the age of 93.

Genevieve's long-standing commitment and support as a Trustee of Catholic Community Services and Catholic Housing Services (CCS/CHS) helped the agency grow to serve neighbors in need of every age and belief across western Washington. Her final gift was an unprecedented \$14 million bequest that established the Catholic Charities Foundation in 2002. In its 20 years of operation, the 'quiet presence' of the Foundation has generated more than \$10 million in grants for CCS/CHS programs and services.

In 2022, with the blessing of Archbishop Paul Etienne, the Foundation announced a more visible and expanded presence in its mission to garner financial support for the ministries of CCS/CHS. While all traditional avenues of giving to CCS/CHS remain unchanged, the Foundation now offers donors advanced philanthropic tools for lifetime and legacy giving.

The agency is forever indebted to Genevieve for her generous legacy gift that launched the Catholic Charities Foundation of Western Washington. With the ongoing support of lifetime and legacy donors, the Foundation will carry forward for decades to come, generating funds needed to sustain and enhance CCS/CHS's outreach to those in need of help and hope.

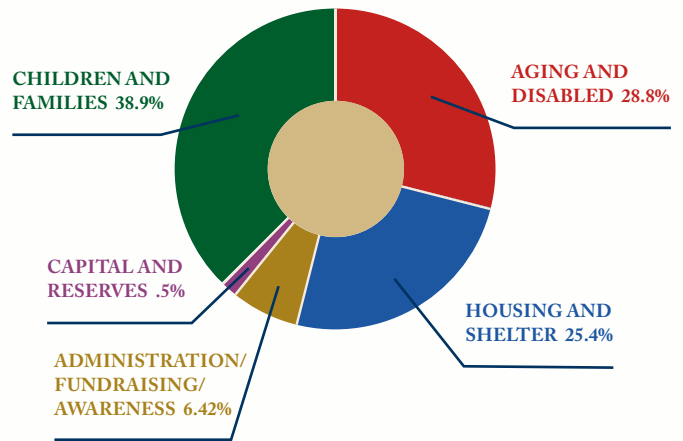
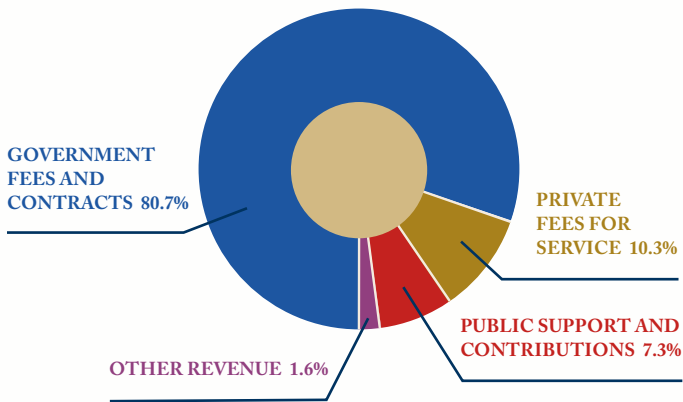

## FISCAL NOTES

In addition to the 2022 Operating Budgets, CCS and CHS are the managing general partners or program managers for 18 affordable housing projects with a combined operating budget of \$11,702,424.

As of June 30, 2022, the Catholic Charities Foundation of Western Washington reported total assets of \$15.2 million that were invested for the benefit of CCS and CHS. For the fiscal year ending June 30, 2022, the Foundation made distributions totaling \$618,866 to CCS and CHS programs and services.
