<p>Program provides supplemental wrap-around support to victims of domestic violence and their children that address barriers seeking assistance due to financial constraints and safety issues</p> <p>Foundation supplies furnishing and equipment for interview rooms, including emergency protective order and virtual medical consultations</p> <p>Staffing: Foundation executive director and program manager collaborate with partners to assess roadblocks and needs of victims</p> <p>staff develop programs to address these needs</p> <p>Staff seek funding, partnerships and in-kind donations for programs</p> <p>Staff raise awareness about domestic violence and the need for these programs</p>	<p>Programs provide:</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> ● Transportation ● Support for pro-bono legal assistance ● Secure cell phones ● Food and water for family while receiving FJC services ● Gift cards for food, gas and necessities ● Emergency-go bags and baby supplies and essentials for families that cannot return home ● Comforts such as books, journals and stuffed animals for children and teens ● Virtual connection to Courts for protective orders and forensic nurse for medical consultations ● Individualized support that impacts safety and well-being 	<p>Victims of abuse can be safely brought to the FJC, shelter, etc.</p> <p>Individuals have support in navigating the legal system and obtaining protective orders</p> <p>Individuals can stay engaged in their safety plan, contact support network, access accounts, etc. without being monitored or stalked via their cell phone</p> <p>Sustenance is available for families while at the FJC (often for many hours)</p> <p>Families have access to supplies and necessities and small comforts provided for children</p> <p>Protective orders and medical advice are available</p> <p>Lock changes, security cameras, moving expenses, etc. provided</p>	<p>Barriers that prevent victims from getting assistance are removed</p> <p>Victims without access to transportation can be brought to the FJC and other safe locations</p> <p>Individuals can obtain Emergency Protective Orders without contact with their abuser</p> <p>Victims do not have to cut services short to feed, diaper or take care of children</p> <p>Families receive resources and supplies if they have been deprived or can't return home</p> <p>Individuals with injuries can be assessed by a forensic nurse</p> <p>Victims are safe from immediate threat of abuse</p> <p>Abusers cannot enter homes, escape detection or break protective order etc.</p>	<p>Families affected by domestic violence know that there are free resources to assist them</p> <p>Victims know there is support to help keep them and their children safe - particularly in the face of gun violence</p> <p>More temporary protective orders become final protective orders</p> <p>Victims can stay more involved with their safety plan and network of support</p> <p>Fewer victims will return to their abuser due to financial constraints</p> <p>Hope and comfort for families affected by abuse</p> <p>Victims with injuries are more likely to follow-up with medical care</p> <p>Less fear of the abuser entering their home and being harmed or shot</p>
