NOTES TO FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Note 1 - Nature of Operations and Summary of Significant Accounting Policies

Nature of Operations

The Scranton Area Foundation, Inc. (the Foundation) was established in 1954 to assist tax-exempt organizations by providing project grants for religious, scientific, charitable, literary or educational purposes. The Foundation may, in furtherance of its charitable purposes, direct distributions to such persons, organizations, governments or governmental agencies which best carry out such purposes or help create new qualified charitable organizations to carry out such purposes.

The assets of the Foundation are invested with the Trust Department of Peoples Security Bank and Trust Company, PNC Institutional Investments, and Merrill Lynch. The principal source of distributable income is derived from investment income of the Trusts.

The Foundation also serves as the administrator for several private foundations.

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting.

Use of Estimates

The preparation of financial statements in conformity with generally accepted accounting principles requires management to make estimates and assumptions that affect the reported amounts of assets and liabilities and disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities at the date of the financial statements. Estimates also affect the reported amounts of revenue and expenses during the reporting period. Actual results could differ from those estimates.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions

Net assets with donor restrictions are those whose use by the Foundation have been limited by donors to a specific time period or purpose.

The Foundation has no net assets restricted in perpetuity.

Charitable Remainder Trusts

When the Foundation is the trustee, assets held in charitable remainder trusts are recorded at fair value when received and in the appropriate fund category based on donor stipulation. The present value of the estimated future payments to the named beneficiaries is recorded as a liability under charitable remainder trusts. The difference between these amounts is recorded as revenue with donor restrictions. Income earned on trust assets and adjustments to the liability to reflect amortization of the discount and changes in actuarial assumptions are recorded as change in value of charitable remainder trusts in the Statements of Activities. Upon death of the beneficiaries, the assets, net of any related liabilities, will be released from restriction and will be used to establish funds within the Foundation.

Donor-Restricted Gifts

Unconditional promises to give cash and other assets are reported at fair value at the date the promise is received, which is then treated as cost. Contributions are reported as support with donor restrictions if they are received with donor stipulations that limit the use of the donated assets. When a donor restriction expires, that is, when a stipulated time restriction ends or purpose restriction is accomplished, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the Statements of Activities as net assets released from restrictions. Contributions with donor restrictions that are met within the same year as received are reflected as unrestricted contributions in the accompanying financial statements.

Cost Allocations

Certain expenses are attributable to more than one program or supporting function and are allocated consistently. Salaries and benefits are allocated based on estimates of time and effort.

Cash

Cash consists of operating accounts as well as unrestricted money market funds, held in trust accounts with banks or by other depositories. For the purposes of the Statements of Cash Flows, cash excludes cash with donor restrictions.

There were noncash transactions during 2018 including stock contributions in the amount of \$153,161 which is included in contributions with donor restrictions for the year ended December 31, 2018. There were noncash transactions during 2017 including stock contributions in the amount of \$167,839 which is included in contributions with donor restrictions for the year ended December 31, 2017.

The Foundation maintains its cash in bank deposit accounts which, at times, may exceed federally insured limits. Accounts are guaranteed by the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation up to \$250,000. The Foundation has not experienced any losses in such accounts.

During the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017, the Foundation did not pay any interest.

Investments

Investments in equity securities with readily determinable fair values and all investments in debt securities are measured at fair value in the Statements of Financial Position. Investment income or loss (including realized and unrealized gains and losses on investments, interest and dividends) is reported in the Statements of Activities as increases or decreases in net assets without donor restrictions unless the income or loss is restricted by donor or law. Investment income with donor restrictions is reported as an increase in net assets with donor restrictions.

The Foundation places its investments in a variety of financial instruments and, by policy, limits the amount of credit exposure through diversification and by restricting its investments to highly rated securities.

Improvements, Furniture and Equipment

Improvements, furniture and equipment are recorded at cost and are being depreciated over estimated useful lives of five to fifteen years using the straight-line depreciation method.

Long-Lived Assets

The Foundation reviews the carrying value of long-lived assets for impairment whenever events or changes in circumstances indicate that the carrying amount of the assets might not be recoverable.

Income Tax Status

The Foundation is exempt from Federal income taxes under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. The Internal Revenue Service has granted the Foundation permanent Public Foundation status. Consequently, the Foundation is required to draw its support from a broad base of the community.

In accordance with The Financial Accounting Standards Board guidance on accounting for uncertainty in income taxes, Management evaluated the Foundation's tax positions and concluded that the Foundation had taken no uncertain tax positions that require adjustments to the financial statements to comply with the provisions of this guidance. With few exceptions, the Foundation is no longer subject to income tax examinations by the Federal, state or local tax authorities for years before 2015.

Agency Endowments

The Foundation follows Statement of Financial Accounting Standards Board guidance for transactions in which a community foundation accepts a contribution from a donor and agrees to transfer those assets, the return on investment of those assets or both to another entity that is specified by the donor. This guidance specifically requires that if a Not-for-Profit Organization (NPO) establishes a fund at a community foundation with its own funds and specifies itself as the beneficiary of that fund, the community foundation must account for the transfer of such assets as a liability. The Foundation refers to such funds as Agency Endowments.

The Foundation maintains variance power and legal ownership of agency endowment funds and as such continues to report the funds as assets of the Foundation. However, in accordance with this guidance, a liability has been established for the fair value of the funds, which is generally equivalent to the present value of future payments expected to be made to the NPOs.

The Foundation was the owner of agency endowment funds with a combined value of \$3,214,653 at December 31, 2018 and \$3,379,621 at December 31, 2017. The following table summarizes activity in such funds during the years then ended.

Liquidity

The Foundation receives substantial donor restricted contributions with donor time and purpose restrictions. The income generated from donor restricted funds is donor restricted. In addition, the Foundation receives support without donor restrictions combined with investment income without donor restrictions funds the budgeted general expenditures. Investment income without donor restrictions, earnings appropriated from funds with donor restrictions, contributions without donor restrictions and contributions with donor restrictions for use in current activities and programs are considered to be available to meet cash needs for general expenditures.

General expenditures include administrative and general expenses, fundraising expenses and program grant and expenditure commitments without donor restrictions expected to be paid in the subsequent year. Annual operations are defined as activities occurring during, and included in the budget for, a fiscal year.

The Foundation's Grant Committee (the Committee) meets semi-annually to review and approve grant requests. As a result, the Foundation has a liquidity policy to maintain financial assets available to meet general expenditures at a level that represents 100% of annual expenses for administrative and general expenses, as well as fundraising expenses, plus an amount that represents the next expected payment for semi-annual grant commitments approved by the Committee, which typically represents approximately 50% of the expected annual grant cash needs. To achieve this, the Foundation forecasts its future cash flows and monitors its liquidity quarterly.

Reclassifications

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Certain items on the prior year's financial statements have been reclassified to conform to the current year's format.

Subsequent Events

The Foundation has evaluated subsequent events through August 7, 2019, the date that these financial statements were available to be issued, and concluded no events or transactions occurred during that period requiring recognition or disclosure.

Recent Accounting Pronouncements

In May 2014, the Financial Accounting Standards Board ("FASB") issued Accounting Standards Update ("ASU") 2014-09, *Revenue from Contracts with Customers*. This new accounting guidance outlines a single comprehensive model for entities to use in accounting for revenue from contracts with customers. ASU No. 2014-09 is effective for the Foundation for the year end 2020. Early application is permitted for fiscal years beginning after December 15, 2016. The Foundation is assessing the impact this new standard will have on its financial statements.

In August 2016, the FASB issued ASU 2016-14, *Not-for-Profit Entities* (*Topic 958*): *Presentation of Financial Statements of Not-for-Profit Entities*, with the intent of reducing diversity in reporting practice, reduce complexity, and enhance understandability of not-for-profit (NFP) financial statements. This ASU contains the following key aspects: (A) reduces the number of net asset classes presented from three to two: with donor restrictions and without donor restrictions; (B) requires all NFPs to present expenses by their functional and their natural classifications in one location in the financial statements; (C) requires NFPs to provide quantitative and qualitative information about management of liquid resources and availability of financial assets to meet cash needs within one year of the balance sheet date; and (D) retains the options to present operating cash flows in the statement of cash flows using either the direct or indirect method. The Foundation implemented ASU 2016-14 as of January 1, 2018. The impact of the adoption resulted in enhanced disclosures about the classification of expenses and management of liquid resources. As a result of adoption, temporarily restricted net assets in the amount of \$18,977,244 were identified as net assets with donor restrictions as stated on the statements of financial position as of December 31, 2017.

In June 2018, the FASB issued ASU 2018-08, Not-for-Profit Entities (Topic 958): Clarifying the Scope and the Accounting Guidance for Contributions Received and Contributions Made. ASU 2018-08 clarifies the guidance for evaluating whether a transaction is reciprocal (i.e., an exchange transaction) or nonreciprocal (i.e., a contribution) and for distinguishing between conditional and unconditional contributions. The ASU also clarifies the guidance used by entities other than not-for-profits to identify and account for contributions made. The ASU has different effective dates for resource recipients and resource providers. Where the Organization is the resource recipient, the ASU is applicable to contributions received for annual periods beginning after December 15, 2018, and interim periods within annual periods beginning after December 15, 2019 and interim periods within annual periods beginning after December 15, 2020. Early adoption is permitted. The Foundation is assessing the impact this standard will have on its financial statements.

Note 3 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments

Fair value is the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. In determining fair value, the Foundation uses various methods including market, income and cost approaches. Based on these approaches, the Foundation often utilizes certain assumptions about risk and or the risks inherent in the inputs to the valuation technique. These inputs can be readily observable, market corroborated, or generally unobservable inputs. The Foundation utilizes valuation techniques that maximize the use of observable inputs and minimize the use of unobservable inputs. Based on the observability of the inputs used in the valuation techniques, the Foundation is required to provide the following information according to the fair value hierarchy. The fair value hierarchy ranks the quality and reliability of the information used to determine fair values. Financial assets and liabilities carried at fair value will be classified and disclosed in one of the following three categories:

- Level I: Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in active exchange markets, such as the New York Stock Exchange.
- Level II: Valuations for assets and liabilities traded in less active dealer or broker markets. Valuations are obtained from third party pricing services for identical or similar assets or liabilities.
- Level III: Valuations for assets and liabilities that are derived from other valuation methodologies, including option pricing models, discounted cash flow models and similar techniques, and not based on market exchange, dealer or broker traded transactions. Level 3 valuation incorporate certain assumptions and projections in determining the fair value assigned to such assets or liabilities.

Following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value:

Mutual funds, Stocks, Corporate bonds, U.S. Government and Agencies obligations, Certificates of Deposit and Money Markets: Valued at the closing price reported on the active market on which the individual securities are traded.

Note 3 - Fair Value of Financial Instruments - (Continued)

The preceding methods may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Foundation believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent with other market participants, the use of different methodologies or assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Note 6 - Charitable Remainder Unitrust

The Foundation is the Trustee of the Midori Yamanouchi Charitable Remainder Unitrust. Upon the death of the unitrust beneficiary, the remaining assets held by the Unitrust will be distributed to the Foundation, to establish the Midori Yamanouchi-Rynn Endowment Fund of the Scranton Area Foundation for Northeastern Pennsylvania Philharmonic.

The present value of the liability under the Midori Yamanouchi Charitable Remainder Unitrust is remeasured annually based on the life expectancy of the beneficiary, using the Uniform Life Expectancy tables and a discount rate of 5%. The unitrust liability amounted to \$19,345 and \$18,284 at December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

Assets held under charitable remainder unitrusts are measured at fair value and are included on the Statements of Financial Position in the amount of \$72,714 and \$80,898 at December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

Note 8 - Leasing Arrangements

An occupancy agreement was negotiated as of September 30, 2014 at a rate of \$1,932 per month for space in the Community Service Wing of the Myer Davidow Memorial Building at 615 Jefferson Avenue, Scranton, Pennsylvania. It is month-to-month with potential annual occupancy fee increases between 0% and 2.5% and with the option to terminate with a minimum of 6 month termination notice. Rental expenses amounted to \$24,420 and \$24,059 for the years ending December 31, 2018 and 2017, respectively.

Note 9 - Pension Plan

The Foundation has a non-contributory Simplified Employees Pension Plan covering all eligible employees. Employer contributions are determined annually by the Board of Governors as a percentage of compensation. The contributions for the years ended December 31, 2018 and 2017 were \$22,403 and \$20,911, respectively.
